CALL TO ORDER-Mayor Irvine called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

PUBLIC HEARING:

PUBLIC HEARING AND FIRST READING OF ORDINANCE TO CONSIDER PURCHASE OF REAL ESTATE

This public hearing is for consideration of the purchase of a parcel of real estate within the Town for the sum of \$5,000.

RECOMMENDATION: Proceed to second reading

Angela Carper, Clerk, read the ordinance for first reading and Mayor Irvine opened the public hearing at 7:03 PM to allow for public comment.

Martha Edwards asked what the use of the property would be. Mayor Irvine stated that the Town will market the property as a whole in hopes that a business may be interested in locating there.

Carlos Curtis asked if the property would be surveyed prior to the Town purchasing it. Mrs. Burcham explained that it is not planned to have a new survey performed as there is information on file from previous transactions with the property that can be used to complete the sale. She stated that a survey can be requested, but it would be at the Town's cost. Mr. Curtis then asked where the property is located and Councilman Goings explained that it is located just west of where Chartwell Motors was located and is currently surrounded by a wooden fence since the home was destroyed in a fire several years ago.

With no further questions or comments, the Mayor closed the public hearing at 7:05 PM. The ordinance will appear for second reading and adoption at the February 11, 2020 meeting.

WHEREAS, he has entertained thousands at Halloween with his Elvis performances, and


WHEREAS, David will be closing his law practice at year end to enjoy a














Mrs. Kroll advised that there is no cost for the property owner.

2. SECOND AMENDMENT SANCTUARY RESOLTUION

At the request of several citizens, the Town will consider adoption of a resolution to declare the Town a Second Amendment Sanctuary locality.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt resolution

Angela Carper, Clerk, read the resolution and Mayor Irvine read the following statement that he had prepared prior to opening the floor to those who had signed up to speak on the subject.

The battle for American Freedom was begun by the thousands of farmers, tradesmen who made up the minutemen.

Citizens who were ready to defend thier liberty at a moments notice.

Today we need a nation of citizens who are willing to work and sacriface for that freedom and sight. The vight to beak arms freedom about Arms it's about the sight. Gun control.

white we recognize that this meapon's law will not stop all weapons crimes, banning guns to reduce crimes makes no sense, evidence shows that civilian gun ownership can be a forexful determent to crime. Laws alone do not stop crimes and violence.

we urge you to listen to the American public and citizens of virginia, and law enforcement and not prevent our 2nd Amendment sight.

I believe strongly in the right of every law abiding citizen to KEEP and bear arms.

Michael Michie stated he is a resident, a retired USMC and National Guardsman who was active military when the Dunblame incident occurred. He stated he appreciated what Mayor Irvine had stated and mentioned that he had visited Richmond the day prior and that Delegate Austin is for the Second Amendment Sanctuary Resolution and in support of our gun rights and that they thought they also had some success with Delegate Creigh Deeds, but reminded people that it all comes down to a four letter word—VOTE. He encouraged everyone, regardless of their party to vote with their heart and for what's right. He stated that there needs to be something more for youth and that the average age of participation in the area is 60+. He stated that if things change, there will be no hunting or events such as that for the kids. He stated that last month was the largest ever in sales at his gun shop and it is all due to politics and the erosion of rights. He added that he and a group of citizens will be going back to Richmond on Monday to participate in the rally and hope to make a difference.

Monty Bowman of Falcon Ridge stated that he has spent 43 years in the Alleghany Highlands and considers the area his home. He mentioned the Virginia Citizens Defense League website and cited that there are currently 126 localities declared as Second Amendments Sanctuary localities and hopes that Clifton Forge can be added to that list. He stated that he had also visited Richmond the day prior with approximately 2,000 people present and that the group had been granted 30 minutes with Delegate Austin who had stated that he is not comfortable with the new laws due to an experience he had. He mentioned a sign as you are leaving Covington that has been there for years that says "When Guns are Outlawed, Only Outlaws Will Have Guns". Lastly, Mr. Bowman stated that 90% of the mass shootings in the recent past have been committed in "gun free" zones and encouraged everyone to vote for what is right.

Corey Clarke of 1229 Ingalls stated that he is a Clifton Forge resident and has been for 33 years. He stated that he went to school with other kids in the area, then signed up to join the military rather than attend college because he wanted to. He stated that he was sent to hot, sandy, Iraq where he and other members of his group saw many things they shouldn't have, all before he was old enough to purchase alcohol. He asked that Council use their "noodle" and make the right decision, which is an economic decision too. He stated that guns don't kill people, people kill people and that he witnessed kids in Volusia Iraq carrying weapons and attempting to kill those serving in the military and that it wasn't the guns fault, it was how the children are brought up. He stated that here at home it is gang violence, and that he hopes Council will vote in favor of the resolution.

Chet Howard of Roxbury Street stated that he has been a resident all of this life and that he has been carrying a gun since he was old enough to do so. He stated that when friends visit from out of Town, they go hunting and they have never had a problem. He stated that he feels it is wrong to ban weapons and think people need to be allowed

to carry them for their own security and has no problem at all with open carry. He stated that guns don't kill, crazy people not in the right frame of mind do and banning guns will not stop that behavior. He stated that people should be able to make their own decisions and should vote yes.

Mayor Irvine then asked Council for their comments.

Councilman Umstead stated that he does not have any guns and joked that no one would want him using them with his eyesight as it is, but stated that he is for them being allowed to those properly trained and who use them in the proper manner. He stated that every mass shooting has had its own red flags and that he has seen some of those within the school system and hopes that things will be improved upon.

Councilman Oeltjen stated that he is for creating a sanctuary and that guns are often used incorrectly, but that the government should not usurp anyone freedoms whether it be a collector of those who have guns just for protecting their liberties. He stated that no law should be made to infringe upon the rights we have been granted and stated that he feels the focus is being placed on the wrong thing. He mentioned a popular Christmas song in which there is a line saying "let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me" and stated that firearms used properly do just that.

Councilman Goings stated that he is a gun owner, owning 4 firearms, and that his wife and kids own 8. He stated that he's heard the arguments that the Democrats are out to get people's guns and take away their rights and that he fully believes that people need to have faith in the Second Amendment of the Constitution which already grants those rights without anything further. He stated that he does not think people have the permission to pass laws that nullify other rights. He stated that mental health is 90 – 95% of the problem and that most cases are never diagnosed. He stated that there needs to be a willingness to pay to properly diagnose and treat those illnesses in order to make a difference. He stated that it is awfully hard. He stated that a recent poll shows 83% of Virginia's in favor of expanded background checks and asked how people feel about that and if they feel that in some way infringes upon their rights. He stated that there have been 114,000 Americans shot during the last year with 20,000 killed over 400 mass shootings, equaling to one per day and asked for thoughts and prayers for those families.

Vice Mayor Marshall stated that as a former member of law enforcement for 32 years and having seen her parents denied their rights she had to think about the resolution, but that she is ok with the wording on this one.

This resolution includes the additional funding being provided by USDA.

MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Mrs. Burcham mentioned the upcoming Martin Luther King, Jr. Day event being held on Sunday at 3 PM at the Gospel Tabernacle Church on Alleghany Street in Covington and encouraged everyone to attend. She mentioned that her dear friend and President of the Roanoke Chapter of the NAACP will be speaker at the event.

Mrs. Burcham advised that the dam project has finally started and that last Wednesday a pre-construction conference was held with members of Brayman, engineer, and staff from the Water Treatment Plant. LeeAnna, Chad, and herself in attendance. She stated that there were about ½ dozen persons on site for some survey work and expect full construction to begin in 4-6 weeks with substantial completion no later than 11/8/20 – 1/8/21 and mentioned that she had encouraged the contractor to finish the project as soon as possible.

Mrs. Burcham stated that she has been working with CSX for years to attempt to relocate the Amtrak station to the C & O Heritage Center. She mentioned a recent bill that the Governor had announced to promote high speed rail from Richmond to Washington as well as a bill to promote commuter service between Clifton Forge and Roanoke sponsored by Delegate Austin.

Lastly, Mrs. Burcham stated that she hopes everyone had a blessed holiday season and that many times it is easy to reflect on things that do not happen, but with the new year, she wished to reflect on the successes and things that have been accomplished. She stated that there are seven properties under development with plans for the downtown, 5 businesses that opened in the past year, progress to ensure areas are viable for the future such as the Brownfields work, work with two independent development prospects and continued interest in all to encourage more economic development, the housing study that was completed, the work being done in the Alleghany Highlands schools, and many other things that benefit our area and the citizens here.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Diana Kling Smith of 224 Highland Street made the following remarks to Council regarding concerns over the Armory Committee:

January 14, 2020 CF Town Council Meeting

I am here to express my concerns about the Clifton Forge Armory Committee and to recommend specific actions.

The Armory Committee is a volunteer committee established many years ago to keep the Armory from being moth-balled by then Town Manager Tracey Shiflett. The original Committee consisted of volunteers and no elected officials. These citizens should be applauded for their willingness to preserve and protect this <u>Town owned</u> building.

• Several years ago, the Armory Committee was reporting to TC on a monthly basis regarding usage and income. However there have been no reports in recent years.

The previous CF Mayor had planned to investigate this Committee, when he became ill. To my knowledge there has been no follow-up.

With this in mind, I made a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) Request of both the Town, and the CF Armory Committee for all records, to include bank statements, for the past 2 years.

- •The Town cooperated fully with my request.

 The President of the Armory Committee, who happens to be our Mayor, Jeff Irvine, on the other hand, consulted with the VA State FOIA Council in an effort to prove that the Committee did not have to release all of the records that I requested. This attempt to block my request for financial information immediately raised a red flag in my mind.
- •Why would an elected official, Mr. Irvine, not want to be totally transparent regarding a building that is owned by the citizens of CF? Not only is it owned by the citizens, the citizens are also paying thousands of dollars for the building maintenance repairs, flood insurance, and utilities.

We, the tax paying citizens, have a right to know why our Mayor, who is elected by the citizens, and who works on behalf of the citizens, refused to be transparent regarding the financial matters of a building that we own!

- *I would also point out that Councilman Umstead is a member of the Armory Committee. And I would also ask Mr. Umstead why he would not want to be transparent regarding this matter?
- •Because the Armory is owned by the Town, there is an Agreement with the Town, which outlines information that the Armory Committee is to provide to the Town, on a monthly and yearly basis. After looking at this Agreement and the records that I was given, it is apparent that the CF Armory Committee is not compliant with the terms of the Agreement, and there appears to be active resistance by the Committee.

The Clifton Forge Town Council is responsible for oversight of the Armory Committee.

Given what I have learned, I am asking three members of this Council, Mr. Oltjen, Dr. Goings, and Ms. Marshall to provide the oversight that has been lacking in regard to this Committee.

- •I am asking that the Agreement between the Town and this Committee be revised.
- •This Armory Committee receives income from the County and other users of the building. The Committee currently has over \$16,000 in its account and Mr. Irvine is paying himself and his wife out of this account for services they provide to the Armory.

More importantly, because Mr. Irvine and Mr. Umstead are members of both the Armory Committee and the CF Town Council it seems highly inappropriate that they should be providing oversite on themselves.

Therefore I think it imperative that Mr. Irvine and Mr. Umstead make a choice between resigning from the Armory Committee or resigning from this Council due to a **conflict of interest, and their reluctance to be transparent** with the citizens of CF, regarding the financial matters of a building that we own.

Thank you, Diana K. Smith asked for about 15 things and received all but one which he was told not to provide. He advised that she could attend the meetings and get any information she wanted. He stated that Angela had helped him put together the information and that he had told her that he was advised not to provide that information because it contained personal information. He stated that he does not pay himself, that he receives \$40 per month for using his personal cell phone for Armory business and that it is an allowance. He stated that the committee was asked and agreed to hiring his wife to do cleaning and that she was the third or fourth choice when the previous gentleman who performed those duties quit. He stated that things Mrs. Smith was saying are not correct.

Mrs. Smith countered by saying that she had requested copies of bank statements and that none had been provided and that the financial records given were sketchy in details, there were minutes missing, no treasurer's report, no invoices or receipts given and that the records that were provided were not consistent. She stated that there are numerous ATM withdrawals showing as payments made when everything should be paid by check and that the agreement with the Town also requires the Committee be audited and there was no record of that. She asked why, if so open, would he feel the need to go to the FOIA Council to inquire about providing the information and that it made it appear sketchy when he could have just given the financial records as requested since it is public funding.

Mayor Irvine then stated that in part, he could not provide some of what was asked for because after a year, he threw the documents away.

Mrs. Smith stated that there seemed to be no set by-laws for the Committee, and it is being run very loosely.

Mayor Irvine stated that the only reason he took it over was because everyone was arguing over the Armory and that they wanted the kids to have a place to go for sporting events. He stated that there is \$16,000 in the Committee's account today.

Mrs. Smith stated that there is over \$27,000 paid out each year by the Town for utilities and other things and still could not understand why being it is a Town-owned building and the Committee operates on public funding that he is still so adamant about not providing the requested information.

Councilman Goings asked Mrs. Smith about her concerns and she again mentioned a conflict of interest and asked that he, Councilman Oeltjen, and Vice Mayor Marshall review and provide oversight for the Committee to investigate the allegations and questions.

Dr. Don Roberts of 701 McCormick Blvd. stated that he listened to Diana's comments and that he had served on the Armory Committee as Secretary/Treasurer from the time of its inception until mid-November 2012 and under his watch monthly and annual detailed reports were provided to Council and to the Town, but he now sees that is no longer happening. He stated that he had the opportunity to look at the documentation provided to Mrs. Smith in response to her FOIA request and to say the least it is not adequate! He stated that he is shocked that the President of the Armory Committee contacted the FOIA Council and that it raises serious questions in his mind as to why the information wasn't just provided. He stated that none of the records are really any big deal and that the voters have a right to have the information if it is requested as they are taxpayers and pay a lot of money and have a right to know how that money is being used. He stated that he asked Councilman Umstead to make the records available after hearing of this issue and that there is a big gap in what is being provided. Mr. Roberts quoted the law by stating that any person who believes their rights through FOIA have been violated have the right to petition the circuit court and advised that refusing to provide information is a violation of that right and that the final determination does not lie with the FOIA Advisory Council, but with the Circuit Court.

Mayor Irvine stated that it was not him, it was the lawyer for the Advisory Council that told him not to provide the information.

Dr. Roberts stated that if he were still involved the Committee would be totally transparent or the courts would be involved.

Charles Kahle of 1235 Crestwood mentioned the Council Work Session held on December 17, 2019 and asked for an update on the progress of the search for the next Town Manager.

Councilman Oeltjen stated that a summarized job description and ad have been prepared and Mayor Irvine stated that the ad will appear in the Saturday newspaper.

Mr. Kahle stated that it was very helpful to be able to ask questions and suggested there be more of a Town Hall type meeting atmosphere. He stated that it is helpful to be able to ask questions and participate in the discussion instead of having to report back or hear secondhand information.

Councilman Goings asked Mr. Kahle to explain. Mr. Kahle stated that the back and forth dialogue that occurred at the work session was very helpful. Councilman Goings stated that sometimes some people say the same things each time and that it resulted in a delayed answer but hopes that things can be improved now.

Chet Howard of Roxbury Street thanked Lori Kroll and stated that his brother has purchased the old eye Dr's building and is planning to convert it into a hotel with a railroad theme and is in negotiations regarding the motel in Cliftondale Park as well. He stated that his brother is also interested in the apartment complex on Brussels Street. He stated that he appreciates what Council is doing and that not everyone is going to agree with you, but it is important to take the job seriously. He stated that he hasn't been happy with some things he has heard, but that decisions are what they are and that they should be supported and mentioned the new car lot that will be going in town, the hotel, and other things. Lastly, he thanked Council and stated that he appreciates them.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilman Umstead thanked Lori Kroll and her work with the EPA. He stated that he is very interested in the progress. He stated that he is 100% for the rights of American citizens and appreciates those who came to state their concerns. He thanked everyone for attending.

Councilman Oeltjen thanked everyone for attending and participating and stated that it is important to know the subject matter on which you plan to speak and that it is sometimes difficult anticipating external comments and sidebars. He mentioned the Town Manager's comments and the MLK event stating he and his wife plan to attend again this year. He mentioned the Second Amendment Sanctuary Resolution and stated that a lot of what MLK stood for is how we approach each other. He stated that Dr. King wanted to lead the way with respect, dignity, and compassion. He thanked Diana and stated that he appreciates all of the comments and that he would agree that there needs to be a meeting and some oversight. He thanked Mr. Kahle and stated that the Town Hall type meeting may be a good idea and he thanked Mr. Howard and stated that the news of his brother's plans is great.

Councilman Goings thanked Dave Davis and his wife Carol for all they've done over the years and told a story of one of the first times he met them at a Halloween party he and his wife held with a "Clue" theme. He stated that Dave participated and did an awesome job and carried the show!

Vice Mayor Marshall wished everyone a Happy New Year! She thanked everyone for attending and stated that she appreciates the participation and input as well as recommendations. She mentioned 42 Deli being included on the "Hometown Eats" show on WDBJ7 and mentioned that Michael's Pizza now has their ABC license. She mentioned The Way Coffee Shop and what they have to offer and the new business, Mountain Field Farm, being open on the weekend and all of the things they are offering. She mentioned the Covington Delivery Service and stated that Mr. Haynes

will also cover the Clifton Forge area, with their service fees rounded to the nearest dollar and the efforts to get more of these types of services in the Town. She thanked Lori Kroll on her presentation.

Mayor Irvine thanked everyone for attending and welcomed Jared Jenkins as the new Town Attorney. He asked that everyone keep Richard Shull and his family in their thoughts for the loss of his brother. He thanked Lori Kroll and David Davis and advised Diana Smith that the Armory Committee meeting will be held the last Monday of the month.

These numbers represent the investigations opened. Some investigations may generate multiple charges against multiple defendants. Other cases may not result in any arrest due to the prosecution being declined by the Commonwealth Attorney and/or the victim. For an accurate count of arrests, please see page 2 of the monthly report.

The clearance rate for criminal investigations during the month of December was 75.0%. Some of these cases, while being cleared, have not generated an arrest yet due to the Commonwealth Attorney holding the charges for Grand Jury Indictment.

The clearance rate for criminal investigations for the year of 2019 was 83.0%. As stated previously, while being cleared, some of these cases have not generated any arrests yet due to the Commonwealth Attorney holding the charges for Grand Jury Indictment.

Cases of interest:

On December 28, 2019 Officer S.B. Sayers was on routine patrol when he conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle for an equipment violation. During the course of the stop an Alleghany County Sheriff's Department K-9 was utilized for an open-air search around the exterior of the vehicle. At that time the K-9 alerted on the odor of narcotics within the vehicle. A probable cause search was conducted and multiple narcotics violations were found within the vehicle. The operator of the vehicle was then taken into custody and transported to CFPD for processing without incident.

On December 29, 2019 Officer D.J. Creedon was on routine patrol when he received a be on the lookout from the Alleghany County Sheriff's Department dispatch for a reckless driver. Officer Creedon located the vehicle on A St. and witnessed it swerving into oncoming traffic. At that time, he conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle to check the well being of the driver. While making contact with the driver, Officer Creedon noticed the driver had bloodshot eyes and slurred speech. He then conducted a set of field sobriety tests in which the driver showed multiple signs of intoxication. At that time the driver was taken into custody for driving under the influence of alcohol and transported to CFPD for further processing without incident.

On December 8, 2019 Officer G.A. Wilhelm was dispatched to the 300 block of pine St. for a domestic assault in progress. Upon arrival he was met by the complainant who advised she was assaulted by her daughter. She advised that she and her daughter were arguing and her daughter had thrown items striking her before grabbing her hair and

forcing her to the ground. Officer Wilhelm located marking on the victim consistent with the reported offense. At that time the daughter was taken into custody for domestic assault and transported to CFPD for further processing without incident.

Chief's Comments: In the month December two officers attended Crisis Intervention training which brought the entire Department to be certified as Crisis Intervention Officers. All officers attended four hours of in-house training on Juvenile Intake procedures and report writing. Officers also attended a joint training with the Alleghany County Sheriff's Office on active shooter response. This was considered inhouse training. We are planning to send officers to a certified active shooter response course in the spring of 2020. With all that has been going on with short staffing and the Department relocation, I'm proud to say that the officers have maintained a positive attitude and a proactive demeanor to keep our clearance rate for the year of 2019 at 83% (national average is 15%).

Clifton Forge Public Library Director's Report December 2019

The month of December 2019 was a less busy time as many groups took a break for the holidays. The Armstrong Community Meeting room had 141 people attend events and various other programs and meetings. The Library Quilters and Threadbenders met on their regular schedules. The Library Board of Trustees and the Friends of the Library did not meet as they took a holiday break. Appalfolks held their monthly board meeting. The Writers Workshop led by Ray Allen met once. The Brown Bag Book Club met and discussed the book "Tattooist of Auschwitz" by Heather Morris. The Foreign Films Club met once. Congressman Morgan Griffith's representative came on regular schedule. Joan Vannorsdall (Clifton Forge Representative) from the Alleghany County Board of Supervisors met with constituents. GED classes did not meet as they continued to search for a new instructor. The Rainbow Rock Genealogical Club held a single meeting. The library hosted a winter themed Toddler Time and a Jack Frost themed Christmas party. The library also hosted its annual Patron Appreciation celebration. Staff members Iris Gilbert and Debra Henn with assistance from volunteers Travis Hart and Lisa Deeds checked out 315 books to patrons at Scott Hill. The Library Director also wants to give special recognition to volunteers John Moser, Cornelius Ray, and Jacob Adkins. John Moser and Cornelius Ray helped with the festive Christmas atmosphere in the library by putting up the Christmas tree. Mr. Moser has also been a regular volunteer in the setting up and breaking down for various library events. Jacob Adkins has leant his genealogical expertise in helping library patrons research their family histories. In addition, Mr. Adkins also has been a willing volunteer in the setting up and breaking down of library programs. Finally, the Director would like to mention the tremendous contribution to Christmas happenings by the Friends of the Library. Nancy Kilian has been the lead person in setting up and organizing the Friends annual Christmas ornament sale. In addition, Friends members, Martha Edwards, Lana Dodson, Phyllis Owens, and Janet Spearman have provided wonderful help in the conducting of special programs such as the annual Christmas party.

Three (3) water leaks were repaired and two (2) sewer backups taken care of.


There was some vandalism reported at the High School we boarded up broken windows and keeping track of time & materials so the Police Dept. can have it when the individuals are charged.



The dam project is underway with numerous preliminary projects either in progress or completed. Several pieces of heavy equipment are already on-site as well as an ever growing stockpile of materials. At this time approximately 6 workers are on-site daily and their progress to this point is extremely impressive.

Their first order of business was surveying and making alterations to our access road. A few small trees were removed and the road widened at key points to enable site access for 2 large cranes. The cranes are tentatively scheduled to be delivered by mid February.

A silt fence for erosion control and runoff protection has been installed around our sedimentation basins. This will ensure that no muddy or contaminated water will compromise our potable water quality. A fence was also installed between the construction site and the water plant to further safeguard against runoff and erosion.

Currently work is centered around the construction of the crane pad and an access road to the west side of the dam's spillway. Also a fueling station between the access road and the crane pad seems to be at or near completion. As I mentioned earlier, their progress is impressive as is their emphases on safety.

In regard to safety, vehicular traffic to the site is strongly discouraged. The road is extremely narrow and has some blind curves. These factors combined with frequent usage by heavy vehicles and equipment make access extremely hazardous. Fisherman of course can use the entrance above the small dam to access the reservoir. A monthly progress meeting on the project is scheduled for February 4th at the Library.

Finally, all regulatory testing yielded satisfactory results and no consumer complaints were logged over the last 30 days.

The Clifton Forge Fire Department answered a total of 68 calls in the month of January. Of these 68 calls, 12 were fire calls and 56 were EMS calls, with 66 being within the town limits and 02 in the county. The department averaged 7.5 firefighters per fire call. The department logged 298.1 miles on our apparatus which includes all service vehicles. EMS calls are listed by type of call and frequency of calls. The department ran 03 cardiac calls, 24 general illness calls, 04 public assist calls, 11 falls, 9 shortness of breath, 03 trauma injury, 01 unresponsive calls, 01 DOA call. Finance Department Monthly Report

Budget preparations for fiscal year 2020-2021 have begun. Work packets have been distributed to all Town Departments. Letters have been sent to outside agencies that have previously received funding and those requests are due back prior to the end of February.

We are working on the insurance renewal for property and liability insurance. Each year we must complete a Risk Assessment Guide in order to receive a percentage discount on the policy.

Dog and cat tags were due by January 31st so far, we have sold 81 dogs tags and 33 cat tags. We are required to have a copy of the current rabies vaccination in order to sell the tags.

Business license applications have been mailed to all existing businesses. They are due by March 31st.

In January, there we 18 accounts utility cut off for nonpayment and four meters locked out. Twelve of those units have been paid and reconnected. The next cutoff date will be Tuesday, February 19th. Meter read in February will be Friday, February 21st.

Bills for Vehicle License Fees will be mailed the first part of March and due by April 15, 2020. Charge will be \$20 for vehicles, \$8 for trailers and \$10 for motorcycles. The decal sticker has been eliminated. Personal Property Taxes must be paid prior to collection of License Fees. Failure to pay Personal Property Taxes can result in stop fees at the Division of Motor Vehicles.
